Class Requirements: You are expected to be prepared for class. This means that you have completed any homework assignments and have your charged Chromebooks, binders, and pencil/pen each day. You will be required to take and keep notes from lectures and class discussions. Keep in mind quiz, tests, and exam questions will come from your text, lectures and class discussions.

**Late Work:** Unless you have an excused absence, work will be deducted by 10 points for every day it is late up to five days. After five days you will only receive 50% credit UNLESS you finish the work in tutoring after school. If you choose to attend tutoring and finish the work, I will give you up to 80% of the final grade.

Absences and Makeup Policy: It is the student's responsibility to make up any missed assignments. If you have an excused absence that keeps you from either turning in an assignment or receiving instructions for an assignment, it is your responsibility to talk with me about the assignment as soon as you return to school. You will only have as many days as you were out to submit the assigned work. Quizzes and tests must be taken within five days of returning to school. Quizzes and tests must be made up before or after school. In most cases, being absent before a test or quiz will not excuse a student from that test or quiz.
