CLASSROOM PROCEDURES

- **Daily Required Materials:** When the tardy bell rings, students should be in their assigned seat with Chromebook, planner, folder, and other appropriate materials (bags are placed under desks)
- During the first 5 minutes of class, students will complete the daily bell ringer which will be on the projector/whiteboard. This is a graded daily assignment which will be turned in on Fridays.
- Raise your hand to leave your desk for any reason (e.g., sharpen pencil) or to ask a question.
- If a student needs to leave the classroom for any reason (e.g., restroom), s/he must have a hall pass before leaving the classroom.
- Homework is to be placed in the homework drawer at the beginning of class. Homework not submitted at the beginning of class will be marked late.
- When the classroom is in order and all students are in their seats, Mr. Carlson will dismiss you to leave – not the bell.

MAKE-UP WORK/LATE WORK

To receive credit for missed work due to an absence, a student must turn in assignments upon returning to school within the number of days missed plus one day except as noted under the Consequences section of the Disciplinary Policy. However, any assignment that has a previously determined due date must be observed unless arrangements have been made with the assigning teacher. Homework submitted the day after it was due will earn, at most, 60% of the overall grade. Homework submitted two or more days after the due date will not be accepted. Information on homework and testing will be on my teacher connection website and will also be posted in Google Classroom.

CLASS PROJECTS

During the school year students will complete a project(s) focusing on material that has previously been covered. Special supplies may be needed for the completion of these projects (e.g., markers, posters, jump drives, etc.). All required materials for these projects, the project objectives, and the project due date will be posted on my teacher connection website.

GOOGLE CLASSROOM

Most homework and classwork will be placed in Google Classroom. If a student is absent, then s/he can locate the work that was missed by looking at Google Classroom. Please keep in mind that Google Classroom is an extension of the classroom. Anything posted in Google Classroom will be treated as though it were stated openly during class. Parents should use the Teacher Connection page to view assignment due dates; however, any parent who is interested in learning more about accessing Google Classroom should contact Mr Carlson.
